2023 - 2024 Highlights:

Celebrating 45 Years!

This year marks a major milestone for our association—our 45th anniversary! To celebrate, we hosted a special conference in May in Edmonton, bringing together members from across the province. The event featured three learning tracks, with most speakers being RVTs, alongside supportive advocates. In addition to the educational sessions, the conference included a full trade show, a behind-the-scenes tour of the Edmonton Valley Zoo, and a hands-on RECOVER CPR certification workshop. It was wonderful to reconnect with everyone and gather feedback for our next conference!

Enhancing RVT Engagement

The ABVTA remains committed to increasing RVT engagement by optimizing the delegation of veterinary medicine, a key initiative discussed at the board level in every meeting and central to our strategic plan. In 2024, we co-hosted panel webinars with the ABVMA, exploring real-world delegation practices in various clinics. We are also increasing communication on this topic through professional development, social media, articles, newsletters, and community discussions. To maintain momentum, the ABVTA/ABVMA RVT Engagement Task Force has been launched to further develop initiatives supporting team optimization.

Supporting Wellness

In July 2023, we introduced Togetherall, a free peer-to-peer support platform for members and their families. Togetherall offers self-help courses, tools, assessments, and resources to support personal and professional well-being. Additionally, throughout 2024 we provided members with complimentary virtual yoga sessions, available on-demand, as well as a series of on-demand wellness sessions in October.

These sessions covered a range of topics, including seminars on meal planning and optimizing sleep, along with fitness classes like flex and flow, meditation, and dance. We are encouraged by the positive impact these initiatives have had on members' mental health and overall well-being.

Strengthening Educational Partnerships

Collaboration with our educational partners remains central to our work, and in 2024, we strengthened this by adding ex-officio representatives from each veterinary technology program in the province to our board. This direct link between the profession and educational institutions is essential for fostering the development and success of veterinary technologists. We've also launched a new student committee and invite students to join if they are interested in being actively involved.

Promoting the Profession

Celebrating RVT Month in October is a key opportunity to recognize the essential role of RVTs and promote the profession publicly. This year, several Alberta landmarks were once again lit up in recognition, raising awareness across the province. In 2024, we also excited to resume inperson outreach at events like the Edmonton Pet Expo, EHS Pets in the Park Festival, and at several school career days, promoting veterinary technology as a vital career path.

Expanding Continuing Education Opportunities

In 2024, the ABVTA has prioritized continuing education and professional development to support members' growth. We've already provided over 10 hours of education, with an additional 5 hours projected by year-end, totaling 15 hours beyond what was offered at the conference. Highlights include a hands-on wet lab in Calgary and webinars covering a range of-

topics, such as anesthesia, sedation, sterilization & disinfection, occupational radiation exposures, equipment maintenance and radiation image optimization. All online education remains complimentary for members, with most webinars available on-demand through the Training Zone, offering flexibility to earn professional development hours at their convenience.

Advocacy and Advancing the RVT Profession

We remain dedicated to advocating for our members and raising the visibility of the RVT profession through stakeholder and government engagement, social media, and community events. Leadership has met with government and stakeholders throughout the year to discuss workforce challenges and the needs of RVTs. Our executive team also joined the ABVMA's annual road trip, touring practices and attending regional meetings in southern Alberta to connect with veterinary teams and address their concerns.

A key focus this year has been compensation, with the release of our 2023 Wage and Benefits Survey showing a significant wage increase of \$2.91/hr, bringing the average RVT wage to \$29.58/hr—a nearly 20% rise since 2019. This data is used in discussions with stakeholders and on behalf of members to employers through various communication channels, supporting employment negotiations and contract discussions.

We are also pleased to see that the 2023 request for a name change from "Animal Health Technology" to "Veterinary Technology" programs is being realized, with all programs set to adopt the updated terminology by the end of 2025. This update better aligns the educational program name with the profession and provides greater clarity to the public when exploring post-secondary education options.

2023 WAGE AND BENEFIT REPORT



The 2023 Wage and Benefits Survey provides valuable insights for RVTs in Alberta, highlighting wage trends, benefits, and factors influencing job satisfaction and career decisions. The average hourly wage for RVTs in 2023 is \$29.58, marking a \$2.91 increase from 2022 and a 20% rise since 2019. The report includes a breakdown of wages by employment category, location, and years of experience, as well as common benefits offered in compensation packages.

RVTs with specialized certifications tend to earn higher wages, with those holding a VTS earning an average of \$35.20/hr and RLAT/RMLAT-certified professionals earning \$47.79/hr, on average. The survey also revealed that 29% of respondents reside in rural areas, 22% work in large/mixed animal practices, and 61% work in small animal practices.

Regarding skill utilization, 62% of RVTs feel their skills are being fully utilized, while 30% feel their skills underutilized. Many expressed concerns about their skills being overlooked or delegated to non-RVT staff, especially in clinics with older veterinarians. RVTs recommended greater trust and delegation, more mentorship opportunities, better compensation, and increased continuing education (CE) to improve their skill utilization and job satisfaction.

When asked about compensation packages, 42% of respondents were satisfied, while 58% were dissatisfied with their current package. Many RVTs feel underpaid and believe their compensation does not reflect their experience, skills, or the rising cost of living. Common requests for improved benefits included better health coverage, retirement plans, paid sick days, and dental/vision care. Some expressed frustration with wage caps and limited raises, feeling undercompensated for their responsibilities.

To improve their situation, many RVTs have taken steps such as requesting raises, participating in performance reviews, negotiating for additional benefits, or taking on more responsibilities. However, many feel their efforts have resulted in minimal changes, leading some to consider second jobs or leaving the profession.

When asked about their future, 37% of RVTs said they planned to leave the profession within the next two years, while 63% intended to stay. Those planning to leave cited factors such as poor management, inadequate wages, lack of benefits, burnout, and toxic work environments. Personal reasons, dissatisfaction with corporate practices, and a desire for better work-life balance were also mentioned.

Conversely, RVTs who plan to stay with their current employers cited strong team dynamics, a positive work environment, and supportive management as key reasons. Many also appreciate work-life balance, flexible schedules, good benefits, and competitive wages. Proximity to home, career advancement opportunities, and feeling valued by their employers were also factors. Some expressed loyalty to long-term relationships with colleagues and management, while others cited practical reasons like job security or limited opportunities elsewhere.

The annual Wage and Benefits Survey provides valuable insights into the compensation, benefits, and career satisfaction of RVTs across Alberta. While there are areas of concern, such as underutilization of skills, dissatisfaction with wages and benefits, and factors contributing to burnout, there are also positive trends in wage growth and many RVTs reporting strong workplace dynamics. The ABVTA remains committed to supporting its members through ongoing professional development, advocacy, and by continuing to offer an annual wage and benefits survey. The 2024 survey results will be available in 2025, providing further data to assist RVTs in navigating their careers and enhancing their work environments.


Honorary Life Membership Award - Dr. Jocelyn Forseille Nominated by: ABVTA Board of Directors

In the Community

Advocacy & Outreach

Edmonton Pet Expo: On March 9th and 10th, the ABVTA Member and Public Relations Committee volunteers proudly represented the association at the Edmonton Pet Expo. Focusing on dental health, our booth provided attendees with valuable information on home care, preventative strategies, and the vital role RVTs play in dental procedures. We also showcased the pathways to becoming an RVT, highlighting the education and training involved.

Spruce Grove Composite High School Career Fair: On April 24, 2024, ABVTA was excited to participate in the Spruce Grove Composite High School Career Fair. Volunteers from the Member and Public Relations Committee connected with students in grades 10-12, showcasing the important role RVTs have within veterinary care. They shared insights into the educational pathways to becoming an RVT and encouraged students to explore this dynamic and rewarding career path.

Alberta Legislature: In May, ABVTA leadership, along with representatives from ABVMA and UCVM, had the opportunity to engage with officials at the Alberta Legislature. The discussions covered important topics including labour shortages, veterinary education, and expanding diagnostic lab capacity. During the visit, our representatives were introduced in the Alberta Legislative Assembly, where MLA Jackie Lovely delivered a Member Statement highlighting the significant contributions of the veterinary profession in Alberta.

Pets in the Park: The 32nd annual Pets in the Park festival, hosted by the Edmonton Humane Society, took place on June 23rd at Buena Vista Park in Edmonton. ABVTA volunteers were on hand, engaging with festival-goers and their pets throughout the day. Our booth provided an excellent platform to promote the RVT profession, share the educational paths available, and inform attendees about important topics like tick prevention, behavior management, and emergency preparedness for pets.

The trip included visits to several veterinary practices and attendance at the regional meeting in Lethbridge. 



Member Practice Type (%)




Graduate Institutions - 2023 Graduates vs. Overall Membership





In 2023, there were 193 new graduates and 534 employment ad postings


